RE: Barrett Law of Commercial Private Roadways – Britton Park/Trade Center and Publishers Business Parks

Purpose

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide the City Council with information concerning the current status of the Barrett Law of Commercial Private Roadways. Specifically, the private roadways within the Britton Park/Trade Center and Publishers Business Parks. (exhibits included)

Summary

Since 2022, the City and the business owners within the above mentioned business parks have been collaborating on ways the private roadways can be improved and what support the City can provide to the business owners. Through the discussions, it was determined the Barrett Law process was an avenue that allowed the improvements to occur while not requiring the businesses to bear the costs in a single lump sum. Once the Barrett Law process was determined to be a way to accomplish the improvements while spreading the payments over time, the Department of Engineering communicated with the businesses of the intent through a series of presentations and one-on-one meetings.

On March 14th, the Board of Public Works & Safety approved the preliminary resolution to begin the Barrett Law process for both commercial private roadways. Those resolutions can be found here: Barrett East and Barrett West. Per Indiana Code 36-9-36, the City mailed official notifications to the property owners/businesses that a Public Hearing will be held at the Board of Public Works and Safety meeting on March 28, 2023. Although not required, the City provided additional information to the property owners/businesses concerning the construction costs that can be expected. An example letter is included as an attachment in this memo.

Approximately eight (8) of the property and/or business owners, including the property manager, were in attendance at the March 28, 2023 meeting for the public hearing. Comments were provided and the video of the meeting can be found here. One property owner hired an attorney, of which was present and spoke against the project with the other property owners being generally supportive of the need of the improvements but had concerns related to the total costs. As such, the mayor and other board members requested the Department of Engineering to revisit the scope of the work to determine if there were other methods for the improvements that could be explored and provide an alternate of the work being performed in 2024.

Since those meetings, the Department of Engineering and City Attorney have communicated the allocation percentage to the property/business owners through the property manager, but due to the requirements of IC-36-9-36, the total costs of the project will not be determined until after full completion of the improvements.

With the feedback and direction from the board, an updated timeline (60 days) for the project has been determined:

- May 8th thru June 11th *COMPLETED*
 - o May 11th Core samples taken in the field for Geo-tech firm laboratory evaluation.
 - Geo-tech firm analyze core samples in laboratory of existing cross -section of pavement and condition of sub grade.
 - Geo-Tech firm will create report on lab analysis with recommendations on possible scope changes.
 - o Revise scope and prepare project manual bid documents to be advertised for bid.
 - o This timeline has changed due to the industry not having availability to perform the work
- June 12th thru June 20th *COMPLETED*
 - o Geo-Tech Firm completed analysis of core samples and submitted report.
 - City Engineering Department is reviewing Geo-Tech report, and will utilize in the revision of the project scope.
 - Continue discussion on ways to reduce financing costs.
 - Complete revised new project manual to prepare for bid letting.
- June 21st thru July 8th *Project is currently out to bid Revised from previous update*
 - Project was advertised for bid July 5th to help have actual costs instead of engineer estimates.
 - o Bids Due July 24th Open contractor bids
- July 10th thru August 2nd **Revised from previous update**
 - Proposed City information meeting to answer questions and share bid results
 - Proposed date for POA meeting for POA to approve conditional road dedication agreement document to be presented at following Board of Public Works and Safety
 - City will be guest of POA meeting to answer any questions
- August 8th Revised from previous update
 - Present updates (bid and dedication documents) to the Board of Public Works & Safety
 - The City is still working towards trying to maintain this schedule however, it is important to ensure transparency, and follow the correct procedures, as opposed to meeting artificial deadlines.

The Engineering Department has been in continuous communication with all property owners via the Property Owners Association management with weekly status updates including timeline, road dedication process, and current steps being taken. Progress was made on determining a revised construction scope. The Engineering Department hired Geo-Tech firm Terracon to collect roadway and subgrade core samples in the field for laboratory analysis and further recommendations on construction/rehabilitation options in an effort to reduce overall costs. Those recommendations resulted in requesting an alternate scope bid, along with a base bid, from prospective bidders to compare overall costs. Engineering staff met with the Controller's Office, City Attorney, and a bond finance professional to continue to evaluate and explore bond financing cost savings. Under the current timeline we anticipate being able to share results from the bid process with property owners/businesses before the beginning of August. The intent is still for the roadways to be under construction and completed prior to the end of the 2023 construction season, but it has been communicated the work may move to 2024 due to pricing and scheduling.

Fishers Health Department Update - 7/12/2023

Senate Enrolled Act 4 - Governors Public Health Commission Legislation

• Hamilton County Commissioners opted in to receive the new public health funding. Fishers Health Department to receive ~\$1M in 2024. Next step requires joint interlocal agreement between Hamilton County Health Department and Fishers Health Department, along with detailed budget and KPIs, by September 1, 2023. Funding for 2024 may increase depending on final number of counties opting in for funding.

Health Conditions Under Watch:

Arboviral season March – November with peak mosquito season in July. Monitoring for West Nile Virus through
vector control activities: no positive findings to date; 45 mosquito infections and 0 human infections county-wide
2022.

Community Health Assessment:

• Writing report based on analyses data and developing community-based surveys, focus groups for remainder of summer 2023.

Core Health Services (June 2023)

- 146 patients seen for non-COVID-19 immunizations and tuberculosis (TB) tests.
- 110 COVID-19 vaccines administered. Booster uptake 22.8%.
- 8 COVID-19 tests administered. All tests are currently offered free of charge through COVID-19 grant funding.
- Reportable conditions continue to be managed at a steady pace and monitored for outbreak potential.

Mental Health

- Launched the new <u>StigmaFreeFishers</u> platform powered by CredibleMind on May 1. First 60 days: 2,301 users with 2,799 sessions on the platform. Users largely from Fishers and surrounding area. Most common features used are mental health assessments (825) around depression and anxiety, and over 195 unique resources used.
- Launched Mental Health Matters monthly newsletters. July newsletter available here. In addition to highlighting mental health issues, the newsletter includes resources and event information, and is a leading contributor to internet traffic to the Stigma Free Fishers website.
- Mental health action teams hosting Service Day at the Fishers Farmers Market on July 22.

Environmental Health & Inspections

• Food Grade and Inspection Dashboard is live for viewing sanitation grades and inspection reports for retail food establishments. Graded 300 facilities to date with 259 receiving grade A, 25 grade B, and 16 grade C. Three facilities failed inspection. Two have corrected critical issues and re-opened. One will remain closed until critical issues are remediated. There are 118 more facilities to be inspected and graded. Grades to be posted publicly on September 30, 2023.

Community Outreach and Social Media

- July social media is highlighting community events, lead testing changes, and service-awareness.
- Outreach activities include participation in Fishers Farmers Markets and community-based catch-up vaccination clinics at area apartments and Fishers Youth Assistance Program.
- FHD's first Teen Public Health Academy begins next week from July 17-22 with 10 students. Interactive learning sessions mixed with skills training. Academy participants will develop learning session for FHD's Fishers Farmer's Market on July 22.

Emergency Preparedness:

Finalizing FHD Emergency Operations Plan based to submit to IDOH July 30, 2023.



Grants and Funding:


- FHD has been host site for Indiana Public Health Association student intern, as well as hosting an additional intern. Both will complete their internship this month and have contributed to roll-out activities for Stigma Free Fishers and assisted various health education and community events.
- We have received a third year of CoAg grant funding, which supports our school liaison position and efforts to improve relationships and services with our schools.
- We have received a third year of COVID Supplemental funding which will continue to support tour Community Health Advocate position as well as COVID testing and vaccination efforts.
- We have received another year of VFC grant funding. This funding supports staff to provide all scheduled vaccinations, and vaccinations for underinsured and uninsured children.
- We have collected \$2.896,541.21 to date from IDOH to date for COVID vaccines administered.

However, allowing those out of state property owners to run these homes as short-term rentals is where we need to put our foot down. I'm sure I won't be the only one referencing the many local news stories about parties and shootings at short term rental homes in Indianapoils, but it bears repeating. Additionally, what is the main pull for having a short-term rental in our neighborhood? While we have a lot to see and do in our city, we have quite a few very nice new hotels that can be utilized for this purpose. If the purpose for the short-term rental tag on this house is for a company to use for their relocates, great! It should be mandatory for this property to be managed by a LOCAL property management group.

Through my years in college and after, I have rented plenty of apartments and homes. Even though I didn't own the address where I was living, I still took pride in the appearance because, well, I lived there. For years at a time. While it would be nice to assume that everyone treats a short-term rental like their own, we have to be honest. Short term renters have no reason to take care of the property.

Our Fishers neighborhood is a really great place to live. My husband and I have been here since 2007 and have been homeowners since 2008. Most folks on our street have been there for as long as we have, if not longer. If short term rentals become a 'thing' in our city, new families, young adults, and Midwest transplants would likely be priced out of the opportunity to own or rent a home in a great neighborhood. Why one earth would you want to cater to short tern renters, instead of new residents that work, play, and contribute to our city for years and years?

I would've liked to have been there in public for the hearing to be able to learn the reasons a short-term rental is the goal for a home in our established neighborhood. Since that wasn't possible, I'm thankful for the opportunity to submit my concerns and comments online. I appreciate your time and consideration.

A RESOLUTION OF THE COMMON COUNCIL FOR THE CITY OF FISHERS, HAMILTON COUNTY, INDIANA SUPPORTING THE HAMILTON SOUTHEASTERN SCHOOL CORPORATION'S RENEWAL OF A REFERENDUM TAX LEVY

WHEREAS, Indiana Code § 20-46-1, as amended (the "Act"), permits a public school corporation to adopt a resolution to place a referendum on the ballot if the governing body of the school corporation determines that the school corporation cannot, in a calendar year, carry out its public educational duty unless it imposes a referendum tax levy under the Act;

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Act, the voters of the Hamilton Southeastern Schools (the "School Corporation") approved a referendum tax levy in 2016, with a maximum tax rate of \$0.2275 for seven (7) years (the "2016 Referendum");

WHEREAS, the Board of School Trustees (the "Board") of the Hamilton Southeastern Schools (the "School Corporation"), being the governing body of the School Corporation, has determined that based on current revenue calculations for the years 2024 through and including 2031, the School Corporation will not be able to carry out its public educational duty unless it continues to annually imposes a referendum tax levy in accordance with the Act;

WHEREAS, based on the foregoing, on July 12, 2023, the Board adopted a resolution to place a referendum on the ballot under the Act in order to renew the existing 2016 Referendum (the "Renewal Resolution"), to be considered in a referendum of the registered voters residing in the boundaries of the School Corporation at an election to be held on November 7, 2023, all as further described in the Renewal Resolution:

WHEREAS, the School Corporation and the City of Fishers, Hamilton County, Indiana ("City") have enjoyed a longstanding partnership, which includes, among other items, winter and ground maintenance, fleet fueling station, educational programming, and student resource officers; and

WHEREAS, the Common Council for the City of Fishers, Hamilton County, Indiana ("City Council"), being the fiscal body of the City, now desires to show its support of the Board's Renewal Resolution and approval of the referendum for the purpose of funding academic and educationally related programs, maintaining class sizes, retaining and attracting of teachers, essential safety initiatives, and changing the previously approved maximum referendum tax rate from \$0.2275 to \$0.1995 per one hundred dollars (\$100) of assessed valuation, which will further strengthen our School Corporation and City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Common Council for the City of Fishers, Hamilton County, Indiana, meeting in a duly noticed joint meeting as follows:

- Section 1. The City Council hereby supports the Renewal Resolution and the extension of the referendum tax levy for the years 2024 through and including 2031.
- Section 2. This Resolution shall be of full force and effect from and upon its adoption and in accordance with Indiana law.

ORDINANCE NO. 061923

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 51, SEWER WORKS, OF THE CITY OF FISHERS CODE OF ORDINANCES

WHEREAS, the City of Fishers, Hamilton County, Indiana ("City") owns and operates a municipal sewer utility pursuant to Ind. Code §36-9-23-1 *et. seq.*, that provides sewer service within and outside of the boundaries of the City of Fishers;

WHEREAS, the Board of Public Works & Safety has supervision and control over the construction, acquisition, improvement, operation and maintenance of the sewer utility;

WHEREAS, the City has established just and equitable fees for service rendered by the sewage works and provided the dates on which the fees are due;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Indiana Code §36-9-23-31, if fees for sewer service are not paid within the time fixed by the City, they are delinquent and a penalty of ten percent (10%) of the amount of the fee shall attach to the delinquent fees;

WHEREAS, the City may, by ordinance, require the owners, lessees, or users of property served by the sewage works to pay a deposit to ensure payment of sewer fees in an amount not to exceed the estimated average payment due from the property served by the sewage works for a three (3) month period; and

WHEREAS, the Common Council of the City of Fishers hereby wishes to amend its Code of Ordinances to add provisions for late payments and deposits.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Common Council for the City of Fishers, Hamilton County, Indiana, meeting in regular session as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 51 of the Fishers Code of Ordinances shall be amended as follows:

§ 51.72 BILLING OF SERVICE CHARGES.

- (A) Billing period. User charges for sewer service shall be prepared and billed each month by the city and shall be payable to the city's Controller's office no later than the date reflected on the user's monthly bill.
- (B) Liability for payment. The rates and charges for all owner-occupied properties shall be billed to the owner of the property. The rates and charges may be billed to the tenant of rental properties served by the sewage works. Such billing of rental properties shall in no way relieve the owner of the property from liability in the event payment is not made as herein required, nor does such billing restrict the city from any collection procedures, including filing of liens in accordance with Indiana Code. The owners of properties, which are occupied by a tenant or tenants, shall have the right to examine the collection records of the city for the purpose of determining whether bills have been paid by such tenant or tenants, provided that such

examination shall be made at the office of the Controller during the hours that such office is open for business.

- (C) First billings. The first billing for sewer service shall be rendered 90 days after the date of the official notice to connect to the sewer system for one and two family residential permits which shall be at the time of issuance of a structural building permit. Multi-family and commercial billings shall begin at the time of notification of water connection. A Certificate of Occupancy shall not be issued until such time as the Controller has been notified to initiate the billing process. The fees, rates, charges and surcharges fixed in this chapter shall be extended to and cover any additional premises hereafter served without the need for any hearing or notice.
- (D) City subject to charges. For sewage service rendered to the city, the city shall be subject to the same user charges established in this chapter for other persons or to user charges established in harmony herewith.
- (E) Late Fees. All fees, rates and charges not paid when due are hereby declared to be delinquent, and a penalty of 10% of the amount of the fees, rates or charges shall thereupon attach thereto. The time at which the fees, rates or charges are due is now fixed at 30 days from the end of the previous billing cycle. Late fees may be waived by the Controller's office based on criteria approved by the Board of Public Works & Safety.
- (F) Deposits to ensure payment of sewer funds; refunds; forfeitures.
- (1) The Controller's office may require the owner, lessee, or user of property served by the sewage works to pay a deposit to ensure payment of sewer fees, based on criteria approved by the Board of Public Works & Safety.
- (2) The deposit required shall equal the estimated average payment due from the property served by the utility for a period not to exceed three months, as determined by criteria approved by the Board of Public Works & Safety. Deposits shall be retained in a separate fund.
- (3) The deposit, less any outstanding penalties and service fees, shall be refunded to the depositor after a notarized statement from the depositor that as of a certain date the property being served: (a) has been conveyed or transferred to another person; or (b) no longer uses or is connected with any part of the municipal sewage system. A statement under subdivision (a) must include the name and address of the person to whom the property is conveyed or transferred.
- (4) If a depositor fails to satisfy costs and fees within sixty (60) days after the termination of the depositor's use or ownership of the property

served, the depositor forfeits the depositor's deposit and all accrued interest. The forfeited amount shall be applied to the depositor's outstanding fees.

- (5) A deposit may be used to satisfy all or part of any judgment awarded the municipality under this chapter.
- (6) A deposit made under this section that has remained unclaimed by the depositor for more than seven (7) years after the termination of the services for which the deposit was made becomes the property of the City of Fishers.
- **Section 2.** All other provisions of the City's ordinances not in conflict with or specifically changed by this amendment shall remain in full force and effect.
- **Section 3.** This Ordinance shall be of full force and effect on October 1, 2023, and in accordance with Indiana law.

The owners of properties, which are occupied by a tenant or tenants, shall have the right to examine the collection records of the city for the purpose of

determining whether bills have been paid by such tenant or tenants, provided that such examination shall be made at the office of the Controller during the hours that such office is open for business.

- (C) First billings. The first billing for sewer service shall be rendered 90 days after the date of the official notice to connect to the sewer system for one and two family residential permits which shall be at the time of issuance of a structural building permit. Multi-family and commercial billings shall begin at the time of notification of water connection. A Certificate of Occupancy shall not be issued until such time as the Clerk-Controller has been notified to initiate the billing process. The user fees, rates, charges and surcharges fixed in this chapter shall be extended to and cover any additional premises hereafter served without the need for any hearing or notice.
- (D) City subject to charges. For sewage service rendered to the city, the city shall be subject to the same user charges established in this chapter for other persons or to user charges established in harmony herewith.
- (E) Late Fees. All fees, rates and charges not paid when due are hereby declared to be delinquent, and a penalty of 10% of the amount of the fees, rates or charges shall thereupon attach thereto. The time at which the fees, rates or charges are due is now fixed at 30 days from the end of the previous billing cycle. Late fees may be waived by the Controller's office based on criteria approved by the Board of Public Works & Safety.
- (F) Deposits to ensure payment of sewer funds; refunds; forfeitures.
 - (1) The Controller's office may require the owner, lessee, or user of property served by the sewage works to pay a deposit to ensure payment of sewer fees, based on criteria approved by the Board of Public Works & Safety.
- (2) The deposit required shall equal the estimated average payment due from the property served by the utility for a period not to exceed three months, as determined by criteria approved by the Board of Public Works & Safety. Deposits shall be retained in a separate fund.
- (3) The deposit, less any outstanding penalties and service fees, shall be refunded to the depositor after a notarized statement from the depositor that as of a certain date the property being served: (a) has been conveyed or transferred to another person; or (b) no longer uses or is connected with any part of the municipal sewage system. A statement under subdivision (a) must include the name and address of the person to whom the property is conveyed or transferred.

- (4) If a depositor fails to satisfy costs and fees within sixty (60) days after the termination of the depositor's use or ownership of the property served, the depositor forfeits the depositor's deposit and all accrued interest. The forfeited amount shall be applied to the depositor's outstanding fees.
